OCTOBER 6TH THRU OCTOBER 12 IS NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

It marks the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, which raged for over 27 hours, taking more than 250 lives and decimating over 17,500 structures.

In 1911, in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, the Fire Marshals Association of North America issued a proclamation that, to promote public awareness of fire safety, it was the nation's first Fire Prevention Day. To show support, fire safety programs and parades were held across America.

It was in 1920, that President Woodrow Wilson made Fire Prevention Week the first nationally observed public awareness campaign. It is still the longest running campaign in the United States.

2013 NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK THEME...
“PREVENTING KITCHEN FIRES”

Cooking in the kitchen is the main cause of home fires and home fire injuries each year. In light of that, The National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA) has made this year's theme, “Preventing Kitchen Fires”.

Here are a few kitchen safety tips to help support this year's theme:

- When you are frying, grilling, or broiling food, stay in the kitchen to ensure safety.
- Maintain a 3 feet safety zone while cooking on the stove for children and pets.
- Keep all pot handles away from the stoves edge, so as not to bump them.
- Always have a lid close by while cooking in case of a grease fire. If needed, you can put the lid on the pan to smother the fire.
- Keep flammable items, such as curtains, oven mitts and hand towels, away from the stovetop.
- Always use pot holders when touching and handling hot items in the kitchen.
- Keep the exhaust hood and duct work over the stove clean, and free of any debris.
- It is good to have a fire extinguisher in the kitchen, placed at least 10 feet away from the stove and near the kitchen exit.
- Always keep kitchen appliances clean and in good working order.
- Follow instructions carefully when using microwave ovens.
- Do not wear hanging clothing while cooking, as it is a dangerous fire hazard.
- In case of clothing catching fire while cooking, always stop, drop and roll immediately to help put out the fire.
- Never hold a baby or child while cooking near or around the stove.
- Never throw water on a grease fire. If there is not an available fire extinguisher, the next best thing to do is douse the fire with baking soda, as long as it is a small fire only.
